The work I've accomplished with the support of GW faculty experts and staff has given me the profound opportunity to showcase my vision for using artificial intelligence (AI) for social good.


As a leader in international education, GW embraces a culture of study abroad. These learning experiences impact how you view the world, helping you to analyze economic, political, and social issues with greater insight.

## FACULTY RESEARCH SPOTLIGHT

Danmeng Shuai, an assistant professor in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering, is using nanotechnology to address the global problem of water sustainability. His research team has created a novel, affordable material called graphitic carbon nitride that can purify water using solar energy. By using energy from sunlight, this material kills harmful germs, including bacteria and viruses. This water treatment process can also help destroy some chemicals that may contaminate groundwater, including agrochemicals and pharmaceuticals.

GW is extending the frontiers of discovery in the nation's capital by building **new state-of-the-art facilities** for university research. Recent projects that enhance the student experience include our Science and Engineering Hall, the Milken Institute School of Public Health, The George Washington University Museum and The Textile Museum, and District House, an 800+ bed residence hall.

# CHANGE THE COURSE OF HISTORY

To land that first job or spot in graduate school, you have to study how the world runs before you run the world. It starts in the classroom, with a research project, or through an internship before you graduate. Our students receive invaluable experiences that open doors for full-time employment or advanced professional studies.

## HOW I GOT THE JOB

My career path was never clear cut. Coming from Phoenixville, PA, I chose GW to pursue journalism with plans to use the creative skills my mother taught me to educate people. Having the opportunity to do some arts reporting in Washington, D.C., I found a real interest in telling stories about artists and innovators. It was through this experience I realized I wanted to speak on behalf of these people, to share their ideas with the world, and after talking to my professors in the School of Media and Public Affairs, I made a switch to public relations.

Last summer, I was a grant recipient for the Knowledge in Action Career Internship Fund (KACIF) and landed an internship with the Federal Communications Commission as well as a KACIF travel grant last fall with the National Endowment for the Arts. Both these experiences further developed my passion for art and tech innovation, which made the

path to working at a public relations agency much clearer.

I found a posting for a public relations internship with Edelman, a global communications firm, and reached out to the poster (a GW alumna) to request an informational interview, which led to me applying for an internship. It was only two months after landing the internship that I received a full-time offer to be an assistant account executive.

What I've learned at GW is that no opportunity is going to come your way unless you pursue it and you don't come to a place like GW to take your next steps lightly. I wanted to make sure whatever I did next lived up to my amazing education!



### APPLICATION CHECKLIST & DEADLINES

1. Submit Your Common Application to GW
2. Submit Your Writing Supplement via the Common Application (Optional)
3. Request Official Transcripts be sent to GW
4. Send Test Scores to GW (We're test-optional; you'll indicate whether you intend to submit standardized test scores on your application.)
5. Submit a Letter of Recommendation/Teacher Evaluation
6. Submit a Portfolio (Corcoran only)
7. Submit College-Level Coursework (if any)
8. Check Your Application Status
9. Breathe a sigh of relief that you've completed your application and await your decision!

### EARLY DECISION I

November 1

Early Decision is a binding choice. If admitted, you agree to attend GW, submit a non-refundable enrollment fee by your deposit deadline and withdraw applications submitted to other colleges. The deadline for Early Decision I is November 1.

January 5

The second binding deadline for Early Decision is January 5. If admitted, you agree to attend GW, submit a non-refundable enrollment fee by your deposit deadline and withdraw applications submitted to other colleges.

January 5

The Regular Decision deadline is January 5. This phase is non-binding.

### SPRING ADMISSION

October 1

The First-Year Spring admission application deadline is October 1.

## SCHOLARSHIPS & AID

### PAYING FOR YOUR GW EDUCATION

GW is committed to attracting and retaining academically talented students who want to be at a comprehensive global research university in Washington, D.C.

We aim to make GW affordable for every admitted student through scholarships and aid. Scholarships are awarded at the time of admission, and need-based awards are made shortly after admission decisions are released.

### RECEIVING FINANCIAL AID

We are committed to attracting academically qualified students who want to attend GW and 94% of applicants with financial need receive financial aid. GW's Office of Student Financial Assistance reviews financial details for all admitted students. Your financial need will be determined based on the information you supply through the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and College Scholarship Service (CSS) Profile. ### MERIT-BASED SCHOLARSHIPS

GW rewards exceptionally qualified students with academic scholarships. Applicants are automatically considered for merit scholarships as part of the admissions process and no application is required (unless noted).

#### Stephen Joel Trachtenberg (SJT) Scholarship

Outstanding graduates of District of Columbia high schools who have been nominated by their school counselors are considered for SJT Scholarships. These awards cover full tuition and fees (beyond the D.C. Tag Program allowance) plus room and board - and it includes a book allowance.

### Presidential Academic Scholarships

All first-year applicants are considered automatically for these tuition scholarships. Presidential Academic Scholarships are awarded to the most competitive applicants in the pool.

### International Baccalaureate (IB) Scholarship

International first-year applicants who are on track to graduate secondary school with an IB Diploma are automatically considered for the IB Scholarship.

### GW Leadership Award

To receive the GW Leadership Award, students must be nominated for the GW Book Award by their high school counselor during their junior year. Eligible Book Award recipients will automatically be considered for the Leadership Award.

### Clark Engineering Scholarship

Outstanding engineering students may apply for the Clark Engineering Scholars program, which seeks students with strong leadership skills and a keen interest in the engineering profession.

### FIRST Robotics Scholarship

Students who have participated on a FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Team may apply for the FIRST Robotics Scholarship.

### Scottish Rite Scholarship

A limited number of merit scholarships, up to a maximum of half of tuition costs, established through a gift of the Scottish Rite Foundation, are awarded annually to full-time undergraduates at GW.
